"Maggie" is sired by "Duroc Prince," second dam, "Frankie" by "Oregon Pathfinder," sire of the dam of Alto, 2:09 1/2, and "Pathmont," 2:09 1/2, the sire of "Pathmark," 2:11.

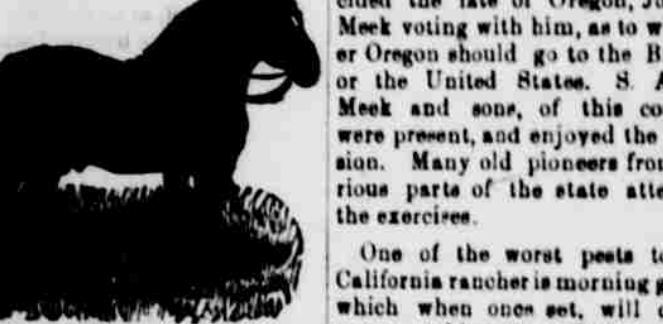
