OUR COUNTY TO HAVE EXHIBIT AT FAIR

Provided County Commercial Bodies Raise \$2,000

COUNTY WILL GIVE A THOUSAND

Sum to Cover two Advertising Proposals

At a meeting held in this city last Friday with the Commissioners' Court, at which President Hollis of the Federated Commercial bodies of the county, was present with directors of the organization, the County Court agreed to appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for the purpose of securing an exhibit of the county's grains, grasses and other resources, at the Alaska-Yukon Fair next year, the exhibit to be gathered this year for the State Fair, and to be ready for the Seattle Fair in 1909. The amount is also intended to assist the Sunset Magazine scheme for advertising this county. This sum is pledged by the Court, provided the various interests of the county shall raise an additional \$2,000 for a like purpose. The \$2,000 ought easily to be raised. The consensus of opinion, regarding the proposition of the county court, is that the money would be wisely spent in advertising the splendid resources of this county, and result in bringing thousands of dollars to the county, together with a larger population, thereby advancing town and farm values.


