HAUNTED HOMESTEAD

A week or so ago, the Argus published an account of the death of Jas. Smith, at Yahats, Lincoln county, who was killed by a falling tree. The following story is taken from the Corvallis Gazette, and given for what it is worth. Smith formerly lived near Laurel.

"The death of James Smith, a short time since, from being crushed while slaying, by a falling tree, recalls the superstition of Levi Oren, from whom Mr. Smith obtained the ranch on which the latter met his death, just over the Yahats divide. Mr. Oren claimed that a number of years ago, in a conflict over possession of this claim, a man was killed. The victor was thenceforward haunted by the spirit of his victim until he abandoned the place. Others settled there and in turn vacated their home for unaccountable reasons, as it is apparently a desirable piece of ground. Mr. Oren bought his predecessor's right" for \$10. As is generally known, Mr. Oren and family are spiritualists, and it is claimed by them that during their residence on the homestead an evil spirit continually harassed them, directing its attention particularly to Mrs. Oren. At one time Mr. Oren's son and an employee in chittim peeling season, were left much of the time alone on the ranch. The son's strange actions, occasioned by "seeing things," so alarmed the employee that he abandoned his situation. The theory is that since the murdered man could not secure possession of the ranch, his spirit is determined that no other person shall have peaceful possession of it."

The Argus has received three communications on the subject of stock running at large. As we can not print them all, for lack of space, we shall be forced to give a brief digest of the opinions expressed by the several writers. All three are opposed to restricting stock from running at large, and the main argument is that it would create a hardship on the mountain ranchers, and stock men, and that the stock might as well have the waste grass along public highways, and in the mountains. We believe the people are the better judges, and that they will settle the matter at the polls, in a manner satisfactory to the majority.
