Barrett, who was elected State Senator for Washington, Tillamook, Lincoln and Yamhill counties last Monday, at the last session of the Legislature, introduced an amendment to the constitution, changing the time of voting in this state from June to November. The amendment was voted on by the people of the state on Monday, and it was carried. The change will save the state a large sum of money in years when presidential elections occur.

Thirty-eight republicans signed statement number 1 during the primary campaign, and were elected. There are enough hold over Statement No 1 men and democrats to make a total of 52, who are in favor of electing the people's choice. The number of anti-statement 1 republicans in both the house and senate, will be 25. Total number of democrats in legislature, 18. It will take 46 votes to elect a Senator.

Geo. E. Chamberlain wins the election for Senator by about 1500 votes in the state. Clatsop county, Senator Fulton's home, gave Chamberlain 300 majority. Port and also gave a majority for Chamberlain. Calkins has twice been elected for Senator. He made a good fight, but was killed all over the state. Washington county is one of the counties that stood by Calkins, and gave him a majority.
