

HILLSBORO TO HAVE BIG STREET FAIR

Will not Hold Celebration on the Fourth of July

EARLY ALL WILL GO TO CORNELIUS

The Hillsboro Street Fair will be held this year, beginning on the 15th of September and continuing for the 1, 2, and 3rd of October. Organization was effected Tuesday night by the election of John Deussen, B. P. Cornelius, G. A. Patterson, Wm. McCourt and Cal. Jack, as an executive committee, with Mayor Dennis as Chairman. Sub-committees will be appointed some time after July 4th, when active work will begin, which is expected to be the coming event in the city and ever held in this city. J. Arnold, of Portland, and the executive committee made arrangements with him, by which he is to furnish all the attractions for the fair, and who has contracted to furnish two big tents, each 24x80 feet, for the exhibits, and the other to be used as an auditorium, the latter free to the people, until 2 o'clock p. m., each day. He will be granted 5 concessions, including steam swing.

Cornelius and Forest Grove After Right of Way

CONTRACTORS ARE PUSHING WORK

Beaverton May Connect With Main Line by July 4

Oregon Electric Co.'s surveyors have finished the preliminary lines from Hillsboro through Cornelius to Forest Grove, and the matter of the extension of the road to Forest Grove is up to the citizens of the two towns. It is reported that the Oregon Electric has agreed to complete the road from Hillsboro to the former place by January first, 1909. Superintendent C. J. Miller, seen today, said that there were now 24 miles on each end of the road, graded and ready for the steel. The work of laying the rails will begin next week. Beaverton expects to be connected with the main line by July 4th.
