## COUNTY HAS BONANZA IN EAST BUTTE QUARRY

### Was Bought for County by Judge Rood Years ago

#### TWO RAILROADS CLOSE TO IT

is inexhaustible and does not have to be crushed

Judge Goodin is of the opinion that one of the best investments the county ever made was the big rock pile, down in East Butte precinct. It consists of a butte about 60 feet high at its apex, with an average height of something like 30 feet, and contains 34 acres. It is in the midst of a beaverdam tract, and is of basaltic formation, and when blasted comes out broken up into about the right size for road work, so that a rock crusher will not be necessary. Former County Judge Rood deserves the credit for buying this tract, which bids fair to be a valuable asset of the county, since the matter of Macadam roads is becoming popular. Judge Rood paid \$300 for the butte, some years ago. Samples of it were shown the Argus last week, at the court house, and it seems to be just the thing for road building. After being put upon the roads, it forms a sort of a cement of its own and will be everlasting. The County Court has been investigating the matter of using this rock lately, and last week, Judge Goodin saw the manager of the Oregon Electric Company, whose line will come within a few hundred yards of the quarry, and obtained assurance that reasonable rates will be given the county, for the transportation of the rock over its lines. Taking into consideration the cheapness of handling the rock, inasmuch as it will not require crushing, and a reasonable transportation charge, together with the almost inexhaustible quantities of the rock, the county can congratulate itself on the buy. The Hillsboro branch of the Southern Pacific also passes quite near this quarry.

#### FOREST GROVE MAY LOSE R. D.

H. C. Atwell, postmaster at Forest Grove, has received a letter from the fourth assistant postmaster at Washington, calling his attention to the condition of the roads over which the two rural routes run. The letter is as follows:

"The department has this day called the attention of road officials to the bad condition of roads on routes one and two. You will take up the matter with the road officials and patrons interested, and inform them that unless all roads covered by rural delivery from your office are properly repaired during the present season and placed in good condition so that uninterrupted service can be maintained throughout the year, the withdrawal of rural delivery from neglected roads will very likely follow.

"Failure to comply with this requirement should be reported in ample time to admit of consideration of amendments of routes before the beginning of winter."

## TIMBERMEN WANT LAW REPEALED

### Which Gives Road Districts Right to Levy Special Tax

#### NEHALEM FARMERS PROSPEROUS

Portland Cream Company Paid Them \$9,000 Last Year

Judson Weed, a well known citizen of near Vernonia, was in town Monday, and called. He reports that things are flourishing in the Nehalem Valley. A year ago, the road districts in that valley levied a 10 mill tax for road purposes, with the result that the people now have 30 miles of good road, mostly graded, from Vernonia to the Clatsop county line. There are a few small gaps, which will be filled up this year, the special tax being 3 mills for that purpose. Mr. Weed says the owners of timber in the valley will make an effort to have the special tax law repealed at the next session of the legislature. Farmers in that section are prosperous, and there is much dairying going on. Nearly every farmer keeps a few cows, and a hand separator. From Kist to Mist, a distance of 25 miles, up and down the valley, the Hazelwood Company, of Portland, paid out to the farmers the snug sum of \$40,000 for cream.

## SOUTH HILLSBORO WILL BE MADE DRY

### Demurrer to Injunction Sustained by Judge McBride

#### SAYS BOARD MUST MAKE ORDER

#### Official Order County Board Put Out Two Saloons

On Monday last, Judge Thos. A. McBride heard the matter of the injunction against the county court, to prevent the board from issuing the customary order declaring South Hillsboro to be a "dry" precinct. Tongue & Tongue and Bagley & Hare appeared for the plaintiff, W. V. Wiley, and Attorney H. T. Bagley for the Board. The Board filed a demurrer to the injunction, which was sustained by Judge McBride, who held that where a city is involved in the territory of a precinct which votes to be "dry," the local option law is paramount to the municipal law, and that, therefore, the county board may proceed, according to the law, to declare South Hillsboro to be "dry." This order will cause two saloons to close in South Hillsboro precinct. The saloons which are now in the "desert" part of the town are owned by W. V. Wiley and Fred Cornelius. The case attracted considerable attention on Monday afternoon, and the court room was fairly filled with spectators.
