Judge Goodin is of the opinion that one of the best investmentthe county ever made was the big rock pile, down in East Butte prefinet. It consists of a butte about 60 feet high at its apex, with an average height of something like 30 feet, and contains 3} acres. It is in the midst of a beaverdam tract, farm of 119 acres at \$85 per acre. and is of basaltic formation, and when blasted comes out broken up into about the right size for road work, so that a rock crusher will not be necessary. Former County Judge Rood deserves the credit for buying this tract, which bids fair to be a valuable asset of the county, since the matter of Macadam roads is becoming popular. 




