JAS. TRAIL BREAKS JAIL AT NOON TODAY

Turns Key With Aid of Piece of Wire, and Walks Out

PROBABLY IN WOODS NEAR TOWN

"Andy" Vaughn Coming With Blood-hounds to Take Trail

Today during the noon hour, Jas. Trail, the horse thief confined in the county jail, escaped from durance vile, and is now somewhere in the woods near this city.

Sheriff Connell took Trail's dinner to him, leaving the key to the door, which connects the jail and office, in the door on the office side.

Trail asked for a piece of wire to clean the pipe that connects the jail with the sewer. It was with this wire that he reached through and turned the key, which let him into the office.

Here, all he had to do was to turn the spring latch, to obtain his liberty. A lady in the north part of town saw Trail cross the court yard, and take to the road near John Wall's residence.

Trail evidently he reached the heavy timber north of town before Sheriff Connell returned.

Sheriff Connell phoned to A. G. Vaughn, the Portland detective, to come out and bring his blood hounds. Vaughn is expected on the first train this evening, and Connell is confident he will soon land his man in jail.

COUNTY BOARD IN SESSION

The County Board convened yesterday, and will hold over tomorrow. A suit was filed against the Board by F. E. Cornelius, a Hillsboro liquor dealer, Tuesday, to prevent it from officially declaring South Hillsboro to be in the "dry" column.

A restraining order was not made, however, by the circuit judge, and this afternoon the court made an order, as provided for in the local option law, which will make that precinct dry.

The suit for a recount of the votes in South Hillsboro may take place at the next term of circuit court. The complaint alleges that illegal votes were cast and counted for prohibition, at the last election.
