In the game of base ball Sunday, between Forest Grove and the Portland Blues, Olmar Dranga, the crack Multnomah club boxer, broke his right leg near the ankle, while sliding to a base.

Birdlock, ch. c Z lock-Snowbird, owned by Fred Cornelius, of this city, has been entered to compete in the races at the State Fair. Al so the brown filly, Hal. B., owned by Wm. McQuillan, of near Hillsboro. Jap. Reeves, of Cornelius, has entered his b. c. Zscho, Zoloch-Boulah, for the State Fair races.

Postmaster Cornelius states that for the year ending June 30 the local postoffice wrote 781 more money orders than for the preceding year. These orders represent over \$5000, and at this ratio the out-going orders would represent over \$50,000, as against \$40,000 for 1907. The increase in stamp sales was over 10 per cent.

A. L. Schofield, of above Buxton, near the big tunnel on the P. R. & N. road, was in town Monday. About a week ago, Mr. Schofield lost his house by fire, which originated from a defective stove pipe. The building was valued at \$1,000, and was totally destroyed, with no insurance. Mr. Schofield is an old settler, and has been living in Buxton since his house was destroyed.

Mr. Otto, of Bald Peak, near Laurel, was the star actor in a runaway in this city, Tuesday, shortly after noon. His team became frightened at a bicycle, near the P. R. & N. crossing, on Second street, and ran up town, the wagon colliding with a post at the south east corner of the court yard, which stopped the team. Outside of some broken harness, no damage was done.

W. G. Wharton, a carpenter working on the new barn on the Schiefelin ranch, near Centerville, fell from the top of the building, Monday, a distance of 16 feet, breaking one of the bones in his left foot, and otherwise bruising himself. In alighting, he narrowly missed a trap door leading to another floor. Had he gone through this opening, he would have fallen another 16 feet, with what result it is hard to say. The injured man lives at Carlton, and was attended by Dr. Linklater.
