City Will Soon Outgrow its Present Means of Supply

Falls Creek and a Reservoir Might Solve Problem

Already the water supply of Hills boro is being taxed to its fullest capacity, by the growing demand for it, as a result of the rapidly increasing population. The best posted men of the city admit that a grave problem confronts us, concerning the future water supply. In time sewerage will be a necessi ty, and that, too, will call for more water. Last Sunday, Mr. Hall. engineer of the water and light plant, visited Jackson creek, eight miles north of this city, and measured the flow of water in that creek, at this time of year. The falls on the creek are 175 feet above the city, which would, if conserved, give a splendid gravity system to the town.
