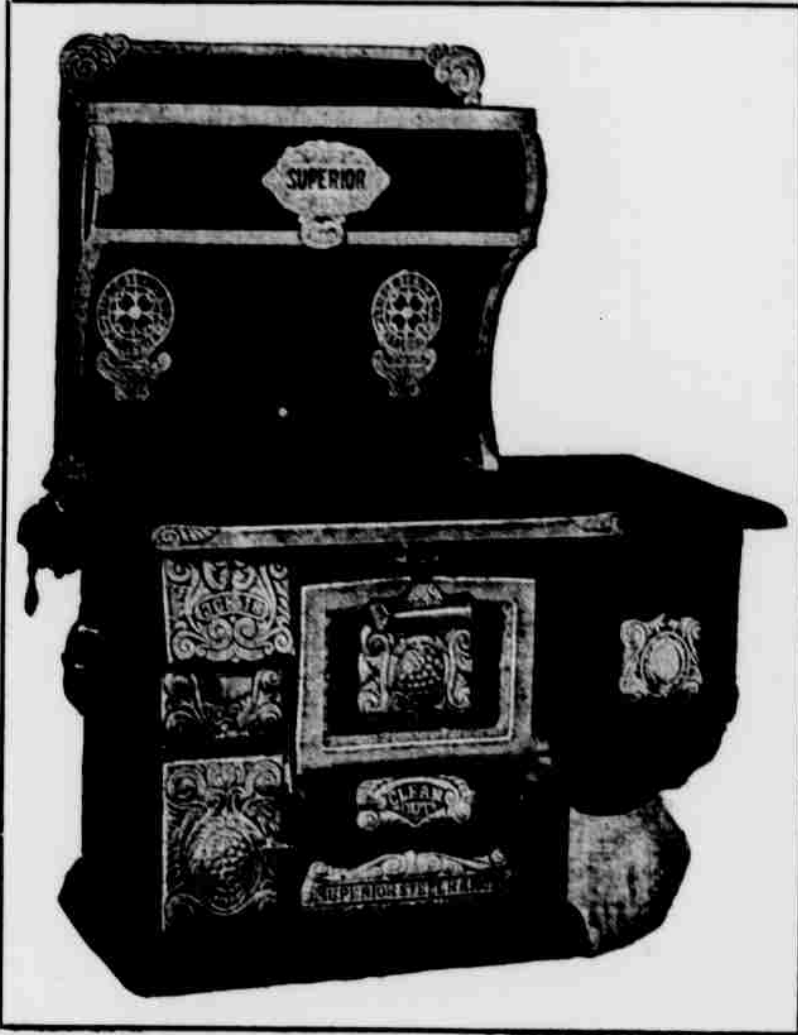

Notice of Proposed Street Improvements

Notice is hereby given that the City Council of the City of Hillsboro, Oregon, proposes to order that the portions of the streets of the City of Hillsboro, hereinafter

mentioned be planked with good solid fir planks, 10 feet long, 3 inches thick and 12 inches wide, said planks to be laid crosswise upon 3 stringers, each stringer to be 6 inches wide and 4 inches thick, by securely nailing all of said planks and stringers, each of said planks to be nailed to each stringer with 1 1/2 inch spikes, 2 spikes to each bearing, said stringers to be first leveled before planking. The streets and portions of streets to be leveled and planked, are as follows: Main street between Third street and Fifth street and between Eighth street and Tenth street and the east half of that portion of Main street between Sixth street and Seventh street. Second street between Lincoln street and Elson street and the south half of Second street between Oak street and Fir street. Base Line street between First street and Second street, all in Hillsboro, Oregon, and that it is proposed to apportion the cost of such street improvements as follows: One fourth thereof to be borne by the owners of lots or parcels of land abutting upon and adjacent to said streets where said improvements are made and the remaining 3/4 to be borne by the City of Hillsboro, and that the City Council will hear and determine objections, if any, to said proposed street improvements at its next regular meeting, to-wit: September 1, 1908, at 8 o'clock p. m.
