**INSPECTOR HARRIS IS PLEASED AT RESULTS**  
**Says Washington County Orchards Are Improving**  
**ONLY TEN ORCHARDS DESTROYED**  
**Will Forbid Purchase or Sale of Defective Fruit**

Fruit Inspector W. R. Harris, of Forest Grove, was in town Saturday, and feels very much gratified over orchard results for the past year. He thinks we have a great fruit future here if trees are given ordinary care, and says that he shall see that the law as to spraying is followed to the letter. Mr. Harris said:  
 "We have destroyed about ten pest-ridden orchards, without opposition, and a number have cut down old diseased trees at request. Over 1500 orchards have been sprayed for the San Jose scale but there was a dearth of spraying for the codling moth. Washington county fruit will be better this year than it has ever been and, in proportion to the amount raised, there will be double the marketable fruit than heretofore. I have notified all county dealers that they must neither buy nor sell defective fruit and I propose to see that the law is followed in this detail. Next year I shall see that there is reasonable spraying for the codling moth and we shall have better results than usual. Washington county can raise a fine apple, with proper care, and in my estimation it gives a better bouquet than the Hood River or Rogue River product. But the rainy weather here demands much care, and neglect means non-marketable fruit.
