The resumption of work on the P. R. & N. line from Hillsboro to Tillamook indicates that Mr. Harriman is anxious to get into the coast country and that his anxiety is a result of J. J. Hill's evident intention to do the same thing. That the Harriman people are not over friendly to the Oregon Electric line is evident; that the United Railways is not now owned by the big Southern syndicate is also apparent. The United people say they are going to Tillamook and the Oregon Electric people have intimated the same thing, though not with so much emphasis as the United Railway Co. There is much speculation about these two electric lines and there are all kinds of rumors about them. There seems, however, to be a persistent rumor that Hill is behind the United and that he will extend this line to the Tillamook coast. Where the Oregon Electric will go after reaching the Grove is at present a matter of speculation, though many believe it will go on to McMinnville and other up the valley points. Railroad men of Portland, last spring, dropped the remark in this city that "Hillsboro would soon be on a transcontinental line." Whatever that meant if anything will soon be disclosed in the not far distant future. This is an era of electric road building and many people predict that within ten years the Willamette valley will be a network of electric railway systems. In the meantime Hillsboro is on the map with three railways to her credit and a good prospect for a fourth.

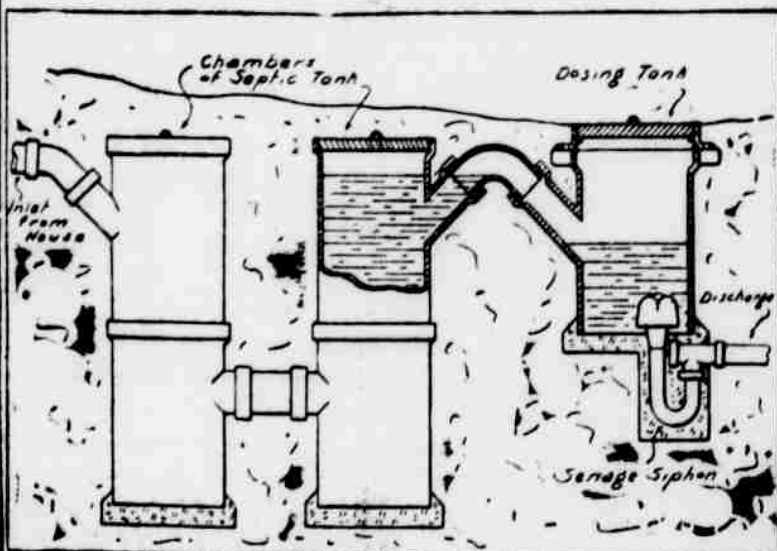
