The Baby Show at the street fair on October 3rd, will be an interesting feature. Several proud young papas are grooming their "Snookums" for the occasion, as are several "Oldweds."

Jud. Nicodemus, of near Scholls, has purchased the S. S. Barnes property in this city. Mr. Barnes sold out his belongings in this county, and last Friday, moved his household goods to McMinnville, where he will hereafter reside.

The Board of Trade held a meeting Monday night at the Council Chamber, President J. P. Tamiesie presiding. Talks were made showing the necessity for reviving the Board. Dr. Tamiesie exhibited a large bundle of letters, which he said were a result of advertising Washington county one issue in Sunset magazine. The county will have an advertisement in that magazine for an entire year, and some thing must be done by the Board, if we are to realize the benefits of all this publicity. He stated that the booklet containing a write up of this county, with illustrations, will be mailed by the Sunset people, when names of inquirers are given them by the different towns and communities of the county. A substantial collection for postage was taken up, and the meeting adjourned. If Hillsboro ever needed such an organization as a board of trade, it is right now. Fortune has favored the town, but the time has come when the people must take hold and push. The best results cannot be had by sitting down and waiting for them to come to us. We must organize and reach out and get what we need. Hillsboro needs more factories and a larger payroll. The way to get them is to invite them, and a live board of trade should be kept up for that purpose.

One of the most important exhibits to be made at the forthcoming Street Fair should be the dairy exhibit. Washington county is famed for its fine dairy herds, and easily stands at the head of the list, in the matter of the quality and quantity of its milk and butter fat output, in this state. That a creditable exhibit of its herds should be made at the Fair, in order to advertise and exemplify the industry, all who are interested in the dairy future of the county are agreed. Dr. A. B. Bailey, who is chairman of the committee on cattle, is anxious to hear from all persons who expect to exhibit at the Fair, so that proper reservations may be made for the shelter and care of stock. The Dr. would also like to see a butter fat contest held, during the Fair, open to all cows of any breed. This contest could be arranged, provided there are enough entries to represent the various breeds. A comfortable tent will be provided, and a man hired to look after the stock, day and night. Wm. Schulmerich, Thos. Withycombe and Mayor Dennis have registered stock, and there are a number of registered Holsteins, at Forest Grove. Alex Chalmers has the best herd of registered short-horns in the state. A. B. Bailey, Franklin Chalmers and Wallace Marsh have pure bred sires with their herds, and Grant Mann has a couple of Polled Jerseys, which are registered, and there are others. It is hoped that local pride will induce the owners of good dairy stock to exhibit. A number of persons at a distance have made inquiry as to whether there would be such an exhibit, and evidently are interested in seeing what this county

Notice of Proposed Street Improvements

Notice is hereby given that the City Council of the City of Hillsboro, Oregon, proposes to order that the portions of the streets of the City of Hillsboro, hereinafter particularly described and designated, be planked with good solid fir planks, 16 feet long, 3 inches thick and 12 inches wide, said planks to be laid cross-wise upon 3 stringers, each stringer to be 6 inches wide and 4 inches thick, by securely nailing all of said planks and stringers, each of said planks to be nailed to each stringer with 4 1/2 inch spikes, 2 spikes to each bearing; said streets to be first leveled before planking.
