The Question To Be Decided, Shall Stock Run at Large

ELECTION NOTICES ARE SENT OUT

Sentiment Strong For Change in the Mountain Districts

County Clerk Bailey has sent out election notices to the 21 precincts, calling attention to the Presidential election. Seven precincts will again vote on the question of cattle running at large. Of the seven, Buxton, Gales Creek and Mountain precincts are in the mountains, and Gaston, Reedville, West Butte and South Tualatin are the other divisions which question the vote of last June, declaring the county opposed to cows running at large. There is much sentiment in the mountain districts in favor of cattle being permitted the open range, as many families have but a few acres cleared, and to keep up three or four cows would practically cut down the forage supply so much that it would be necessary to sell off a part of the stock. Many of the people living in the mountainous districts have limited means, and to keep up their stock works a hardship on them. It is proper that local option should be given each precinct, so that each may determine such questions for itself.
In the more thickly settled sections, a majority sentiment favors restricting stock from running at large.
