The present campaign has not been characterized by great interest on either side. The real issues have been clouded by charges and counter charges. Both candidates however, have been accorded large crowds, wherever they have spoken. Republicans concede that the election will be closer than in former years, but it looks as though Taft would win. He has come out plainly and unequivocally against the trusts, and has announced that he will carry out, so far as possible the policies of Roosevelt, in regard to those predatory interests. Oregon will, it is believed, give Taft its usual republican majority.

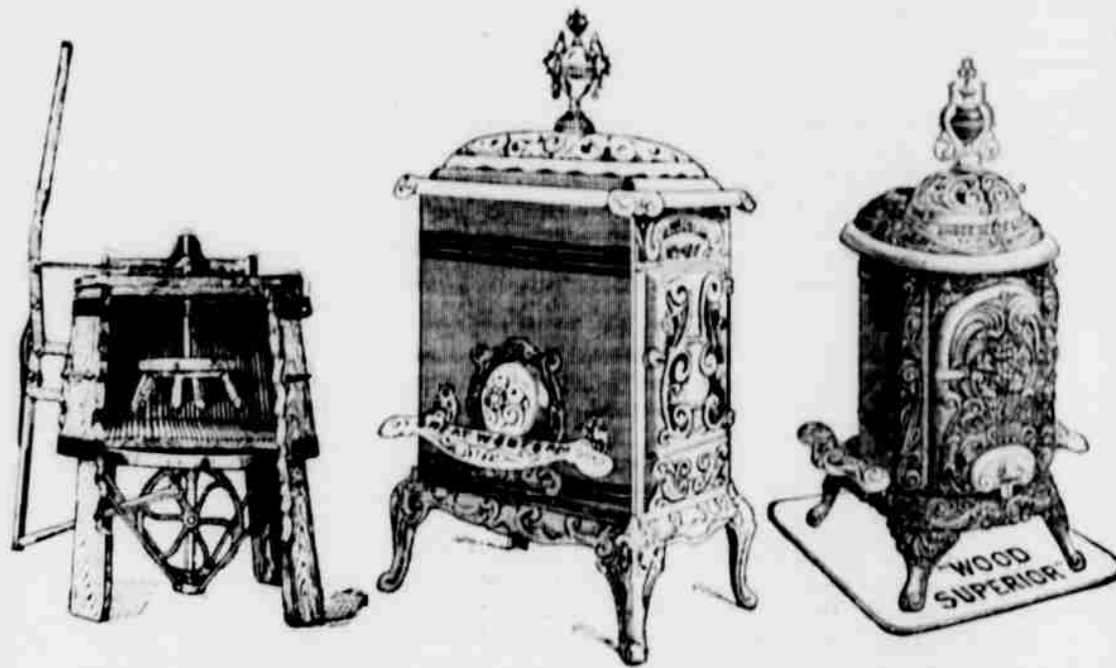
