HON. M. C. GEORGE SPEAKS

Ex Congressman M. C. George, of Portland, spoke to a small audience at the Courthouse Monday night. The night was rainy and chilly, and there were few in from the country, but the speaker made one of his usually good speeches and deserved a better house. He discussed the questions at issue between the two parties in a convincing way and showed that the policies of the republican party when put into practice had always resulted in prosperity for the masses and great progress as a nation. He paid a glowing tribute to President Roosevelt and his efforts to enforce the law so that all classes might have equal and exact justice. He said that Taft was the real friend of the working man and that he had come out boldly and unequivocally for the rights of labor and predicted the Ohioan's election by a decisive majority. He thought the people should not try the experiment of a change of party at this time when so many great enterprises were under way in the west. The speaker was heartily applauded on telling points. He spoke for nearly two hours. A number of ladies graced the occasion with their presence.

McMinnville has a new condensed milk factory, there is another at North Bend, and one at Amity, all owned by the Willamette Valley Condensed Milk Company.

Quite a number of persons have registered at the Clerk's office thus far, this week. Indications are, however, that many voters in the county have not registered at any time this year.

The Ladd heirs are conveying all their interests in this county, as well as in other counties, to the Ladd Estate Company, of Portland. The property owned by the heirs in this county comprises 160 acres.

Victor Callier, of near Cornelius, was in the city, Tuesday. He says he has several acres of potatoes which were not touched by the early frost, some weeks ago. His is hill land, which generally escapes the frost.

The second metal stairway section of the fire escape for the Hillsboro public school building arrived the latter part of last week, and has been placed in position by U. G. Gardner. It cost the district about \$140, plus the work of placing it in position.

A motor cycle was run over and smashed by a locomotive of the Willamette Construction Company last Sunday, on Washington near First street. The cycle, which was a new one just out of the shops, was on the track, and the owner signalled the engineer to stop, but as steam was escaping from the engine at the time, the latter did not see the signals nor the cycle, the result being a smash up. The cycle was owned by the construction company.

Dr. Linklater has the first International auto-buggy ever sold in Oregon. It has two seats, and will travel all the way from 2 to 20 miles per hour, and is propelled by an 18 horse power gasoline engine. The new machine has wheels of the regulation buggy size, except that all four wheels are of the same circumference. The buggy cost \$850, and was brought out from Portland last Thursday afternoon, by F. E. Hartman, one of the proprietors of the Hillsboro Automobile Garage, in company with Dr. Linklater.

Dr. Bailey bought a 6-year-old cow which is a grand-daughter of Brown Bessie, the cow that took the world's prize as the champion butter animal at the Chicago Exposition. She is a daughter of Chief Engineer, one of the choice herd bulls owned by Ladd Estate. The heifers bought by Mann and Reasoner are also grand-daughters of Brown Bessie.
