Oregon, in 1904, gave Roosevelt 60,455; Parker, 17,521. Oregon has 4 electoral votes. New York leads with 39 electoral votes, and Illinois is second, with 27; Ohio, 23, and Indiana with 15. In 1904, Roosevelt received 336 electoral votes, and Parker 140.
