WHITNEY CASE GOES TO THE JURY TODAY

Former Grove Dentist on Trial for Manslaughter

IS MULTNOMAH CIRCUIT COURT

Aunt of Victim Proves a Good Witness For State

The trial of G. B. Whitney, formerly of Forest Grove, charged with the death of Miss Mabel Wirtz, of that city, is now before a jury in Multnomah County, and it is expected a verdict will be reached today. He is being defended by John A. Jeffrey, Portland's leading criminal lawyer.

Mrs. Lizzie Wirtz, aunt-by-marriage of the unfortunate girl, testified that Whitney freely told her of his part in the affair, before Miss Wirtz died. Dr. Ray Matson, who performed a post-mortem examination on the deceased, said death was attributable to mercurial poisoning, in a virulent form.

The defense is trying to show that the girl's death was due to mispractice of the attending physician, Dr. Gilbert.

At press hour report comes that Whitney is convicted of manslaughter.
