ELECTED U.S. SENATOR

Senator Barrett keeps Pledge and Votes People's Choice

GREER AND BINES VOTE FOR CAKE

Senator Wood and Representative Meck Vote for Fulton

At noon, Tuesday, the Oregon legislature proceeded to vote for Uni ted States Senator, in separate houses. Chamberlain received 19 votes in the Senate, and 34 in the House-necessary to elect, 46 votes Having received a total of 53 votes his election was made certain. In the House Fulton received 12 and in the Senate, 7, or a total of 19 Cake received 3 in the Senate, and 14 in the House, a total of 17. A single vote was cast for Judge Bean by a Sepator. Of the Washington County members, Sepator Barrett voted for the people's choice, who was Mr Chamberlain. Of the other members from this county, who were pledged to vote for the republican voters' choice, Representatives Greer and Hines followed their pledges and voted for Cake, who carried both state and county over Fulton, Cake's county majority being 114 All the republican candidates for the legislature in this county excepting Barrett agreed to vote for the republican voters' choice, who later proved to be Cake. Wood and Meek cast their votes for

Fulton. Senator Barrett, before voting, thus explained his vote: Barrett-Mr. President: I feel, before casting my vote, that it is due to myseli and to my constituents to make a brief statement of the motives that actuate me n the vote that I shall cast. I have, dur ing all my life, been a consistent member of the Republican party. That party has honored me by sending me to the Legis lature of this state three times prior to District Attorney of the Fifth Judicial District for two terms; in fact, the Republican party of Washington County, in my district, have never, when I have asked their pledge, fai'ed to support me I have been arged not to vote for anyone except a Republican for United States senator. I have received quite a number of telegroms this morning from people who reside in my own town, men who are my personal friends and men who have consistently supported me in every political campaign in which I have been rugaged in the past. I will state, how that if this was left to my personal choice, if I was acting independently for myself, I would vote for Mr. Fulton, as am under more obligations, perhaps, to Mr. Pulton than any other man in politics in the State of Oregon. Prior to the primary election I made a statement to dedication within the coming the Republican committee that I would support the party choice for United States Senator. Owing to the fact that I made We still have a few bargains in that statement, I am somewhat in a peculiar position with my Republican friends. I realize that I supported and did all I could for the nomination of Mr. Fulton, believing that he was best qualified to represent the interests of this state in longress, not only on account of his ability, but on account of the number of years' service that he had had in the ofice; that he had had on important com mittees; but in the district that I repre sent, to my surprise when the vote came in Mr. Cake had carried the district, including my own county, having a major ity of 207 over Mr. Fu'ton in the 24th Senatorial District. Mr. Cake had said he did not wish the position unless he was the people's choice. While I have been accused of being inconsistent, yet I have felt that it was really no longer for me to say that, if elected, I would support the Republican party's choice, bewant the nomination-did not want the election, unless he was the people's choice, I then made public statements that, if elected, I would support the people's choice for United States Senator, While I never solicited any indorsement by any Statement No. 1 convention, ye received that indorsement. I received the support of the Statement No. 1 peo-ple in the 24th district along with the Republicans who perhaps thought that I would, perhaps, abide by the former statement and would disregard the last statement. Now, in my district, I have looked up the matter. I find that every county in the district that I represent voted overwh luningly for the law that was submitted directing the members o the Legislature to vote for the people' choice. In the 24th district there was a majority of 4083 in my favor. Perhaps if I had not made any personal pledge I would be willing to disregard this majority of 4083, but after a very careful consideration was matter, having considered it as Republican, having considered it from all phases, and taking into consideration, also, the fact that Oregon electors, by an overwhelming majority, voted for popular election of U. S. Senstor, I have made up my mind that, while
