About 5 years ago, the post-office at Hillsboro was burglarized, and about \$400 in cash, and a like amount in stamps were taken by the robber, who stole a horse and buggy and made good his escape. The buggy and animal were recovered between Reelville and Scholls, soon afterward, but the robber was never apprehended. Last Sunday, a son of F. C. Clark, on whose place the buggy was found, while walking about in the brush, found an iron drawer which belonged to the Hillsboro safe, which he took to the house. In the drawer were found a lot of Ex Postmaster Rufus Waggoner's private papers, including his original pension papers. The drawer and articles were turned over to Judge Kindt, of Kinton, who this week brought them to Hillsboro, and gave them into the hands of Sheriff Hancock. Mr. Kindt, who is a son-in-law of Mr. Waggoner, notified the latter at Nyebrook, of the find, which will be at his disposal. The papers were not much injured after their 5 years exposure to the elements.

GANG OF JAPANESE HELD FOR GAMBLING
Preliminary Hearing had before Judge Kindt at Kinton
HELD TO THE GRAND JURY
Jap. Vice Consul, of Portland, Present at Hearing

Eleven Japanese laborers, employed near Kinton, were arrested last week, on charge of gambling. They appeared before Judge Kindt, magistrate at Kinton. The Japs were represented by Y. Mateui, Vice-Consul for the Mikado at Portland, and the State by District D-puty, T. H. Tongue. The evidence was such that the Japanese were bound over to the grand jury, but as they had no money, it was arranged that they should go to work, and at the end of every week, turn over their wages to Judge Kindt, as bail money, in the sum of \$20 each. Later the whole crowd was sued for road poll tax by Ernest Hite, road supervisor of the Kinton district. They also arranged to pay the amount of the polls tax, adjudged by the Court, in the same manner. A few days previous to the arrest of the "little brown men," their "boss" collected the money due on a job of work on which the gang had been engaged, and skipped, without settling with his countrymen.
