## LABORERS STRIKE ON P. R. & N., AT BAY

### Dagoes Arm Themelves and Drive off the Bosses

#### MORE WAGES OR "KILLA DA BOSS"

#### Sheriff Heads posse and Arrests the Ringleaders

On the 8th inst. 150 Hungarians and Poles employed on the western end of the P. R. & N. extension, near Tillamook City, declared for more wages, and upon being refused, went on the war path with shotguns, Winchesters and revolvers, and drove off the foreman and walking bosses, threatening to kill them if they did not leave the works. They then drove the locomotives out of the Hobsonville tunnel, and chased the foreman to Tillamook City. Sheriff Greenhaw swore in ten deputies, armed them with Winchesters, and met the out fit, which was flushed with victory and "dago red," and turned the tide. He arrested four of the ringleaders, and took them to Tillamook. Foreman Lee Barker was beaten with a scuffling while an automatic pistol was held to his head. Others were told to get out or they would be killed. The rioters struck for \$2.25 per day, after receiving a raise of 75c per day, only four days previous. Each one has a gun of some sort, ranging from a Winchester to an automatic pistol. Trouble is expected when the dagoes are paid off, as they have several barrels of wine cached away. The ringleaders of the mob will probably get a chance to work at the foundry business at Salem. It is said to be a fact that nearly all of the Greeks and Hungarians go armed, and are a dangerous class when aroused.

## REBECCA JANE FANNO

Rebecca Jane Fanno, a pioneer of 1849, died at her home in this county, about seven miles west of Portland, Sunday morning, April 11, 1909, aged 89 years, 10 months and 10 days. Mrs. Fanno was born in Kentucky March 30, 1819. When she was 7 years old the family emigrated to Indiana. In the Spring of 1849 she, in company with two of her brothers, Thomas and Robert Denny, left Indiana for Oregon and crossed the plains by ox-team, reaching the Willamette Valley in the Fall of 1849. She taught school at Foster and Hillsburg, in Clackamas county, in 1849 and 1850. On April 17, 1851 she was married to Augustus Fanno, and immediately afterward settled on a donation land claim of 640 acres seven miles west of Portland, where she continued to reside until her death, and the claim is still owned by the Fanno family. Her husband died June 30, 1884. Mrs. Fanno was the mother of six children, four of whom survive, namely: Mrs. I. L. Morelock, of Beaverton; Mrs. J. D. Wilmet, of Portland; Augustus J. Fanno, of Portland; and Augustus R. Fanno, of Milwaukie. She also leaves five grand-children and one great grand-child. The funeral was held at Ames Chapel, Tuesday forenoon.

## INSTITUTE AT GROVE

Teachers from the western part of Washington County met at Forest Grove Saturday at a local institute. The attendance was larger than expected and the programme for the day proved profitable to the assembled pedagogues. At the morning session Miss Mary F. Farnham, of Pacific University, gave a talk on "Literature in the Grades." Professor E. J. Hadley, of Portland, gave his ideas on the "Management of a School as a Whole," and "Arithmetic" was the subject treated by Professor S. F. Ball, of Arleta. In the afternoon the children of the Forest Grove school presented a literary and musical programme, which reflected credit upon the local teachers. "Blunders in Our Everyday Speech" was the subject of an address by Professor Ball, and "Geography" was the theme of Professor Hadley. Professor E. C. Taylor, of Pacific University, spoke on the "Relation of the Public Schools to Higher Education."

The new county road maps are about ready to be delivered to the County Court. Wilkes Bros have just received a shipment of the maps and are preparing to put them in book form. Each map, when complete, will contain 256 sheets, 21x30 inches, which will give all the county roads, water courses, donation land claims and sub-divisions, together with the present owners of land. Townsites are also given, with lot numbers and lines. The County paid Wilkes \$2,000 for three of these maps, two of which will be in blue and white, and one all blue print, the latter for the use of precinct assessors. The map has taken a vast amount of careful work, and reflects credit on the compilers.
