He is touring the Northwest and California in his French car, and when asked by an Argus representative, what he had seen some of the finest young draft horses in this section to be found in the United States.

M. Pernot said that Oregon had been one of the first states to take up importations of good draft stock, and he is very much gratified to see three and four year old Percherons, Shires and Belgians, here, standing in herds and over, and weighing over 1000 lbs. He says that Oregon is the ideal climate for horse breeding and from what he has seen he will soon lead the entire United States in draft, coach and driving animals.

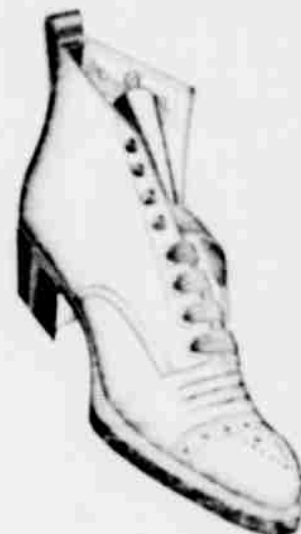
