Law Says Must Pungle \$100 Before Casting Line

CAN FISH ON YOUR OWN LAND

Without Contributing to the State of Oregon

Beginning with May 1, if you want to fish, you must see County Clerk J. W. Bailey and pay him a dollar for a license.

There is a minimum fine of \$25 and a maximum fine of \$150 for violation of the statute.

No explosives or lights are allowed, and trout under six inches in length must be thrown back.

There is one good feature about the law however. If you own a farm, and a brook runs through it, you are not required to have a license in order to fish upon your home land.
