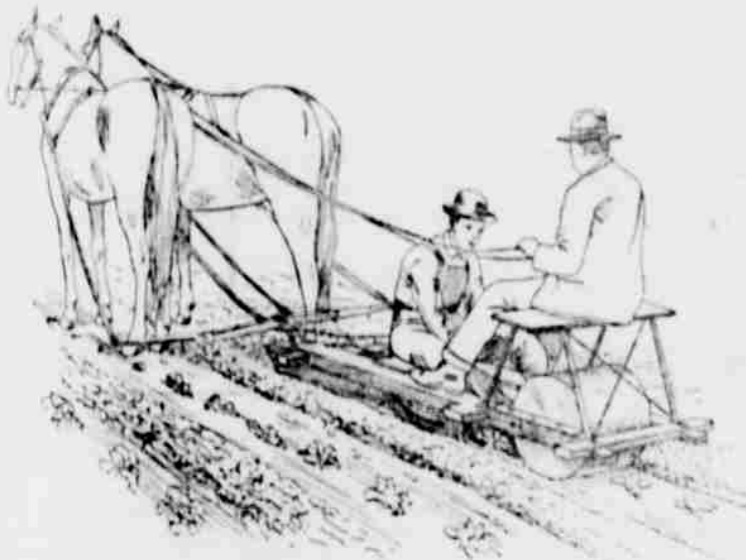

The Art of Lying.

If we had to confine ourselves strictly to the truth conversation would be limited to such platitudes as "two and two are four," "the square of the hypotenuse is equal to the sum of the squares of the other two sides," "the earth is round," "the sun is on time today," and the like.

Whereas truth is limited, minutely and painfully exclusive, one has not to be at all particular about lies. They may take any form and disport in any garb.

A lie never has to be verified. Nevertheless it is just as well to bear in mind that the art of lying requires a certain degree of consistency, for lies well told and rigorously insisted upon have been known to pass current as truth for centuries, often to the annoyance and headlessness of those who tried to set things right.

Coloring of a Water Snake.

Among snakes even partial albinism is rare, while wholly white individuals are unknown. Considerable interest therefore attaches to an account of a common water snake of the former type given by G. Tornlee in a Berlin natural history journal. The specimen, which was obtained in the neighborhood of Berlin and is preserved in the museum of that city, is not altogether colorless, although much of the coloring is very pale. On the back are a number of brownish red spots. There is also a pale yellowish neckband with a blackish brown band behind it. In the eye the iris presents a number of yellowish brown pigment spots, and the pupil is mainly dark red. Very noteworthy is the fact that the tongue is white instead of the normal black.—Field.
