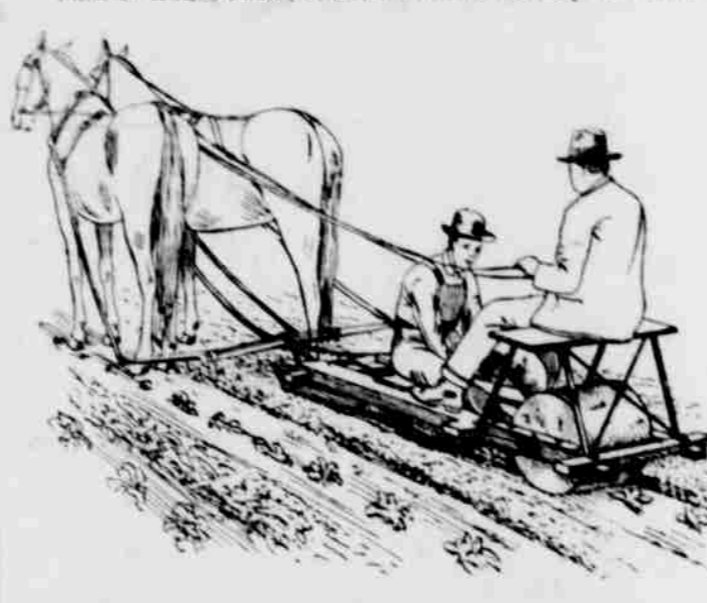
"Where men have as much of it as you have there's none left for us women."

JOHN D. ROSELAIR Kills his Wife at Timber

(Continued from First Page)

worked for a short time as a solicitor in the Martin & Reynolds Company, manufacturers agents, Portland.

Roselair is still under the observation of Dr. F. A. Bailey, who will be called upon to render an opinion as to the man's mental condition, and for that reason people are not permitted to converse with him, outside of the officials.

Yesterday, Roselair's daughter, Mrs. Marie Peterson, arrived in Hillsboro with her husband, and was allowed to speak with the prisoner through the bars. Father and daughter shook hands and conversed for a few moments while the interview came to an end, and the daughter, with her husband, returned to Portland, where they are staying, having lately come up from Sacramento.

Roselair was badly frightened Monday night, when precautions were taken by Sheriff Hancock to prevent any attempt which might be made toward lynching the prisoner, and begged the sheriff to protect him.

Roselair committed a double murder when he killed his wife, as she would in time have become a mother. This fact, which is vouched for by a physician in this city, makes the crime with which Roselair is charged all the more heinous, and brands him as a monster devoid of all human feeling.

Several Portland women are known to have answered the ad, and two of them went to the extent of meeting the fellow. One young woman in particular was impressed by a letter she received from Roselair after she had responded to his advertisement. She met him and he told her of valuable property which he owned by him, and of the happy home he could supply. But he branched out into socialism and talked in a way which frightened the girl from ever meeting him again. He continued the advertisement, and it is presumed finally induced the victim of Saturday's tragedy to go with him to his mountain home.

Mrs. Dombrow, of Los Angeles, arrived in this city at 2 o'clock this afternoon, and went immediately to the hotel. Roselair after she had remained for some moments alone with the dead. The remains of the daughter will be taken to Portland this afternoon, and cremated tomorrow. A brother and sister of the deceased will arrive in Portland this afternoon from Los Angeles. The casket was covered with flowers this afternoon, the kindly gift of Hillsboro womanhood. The mother is an elderly Jewish lady, and said that the Jewish societies of Portland were making arrangements for the cremation of her daughter's remains.
