A cannery would provide the market, and yet the sentiment does not seem strong enough to get it. If Hillsboro is to have a cannery, local capital must build and equip it. The fellows who have canning machinery to sell are not the class to promote such industries.

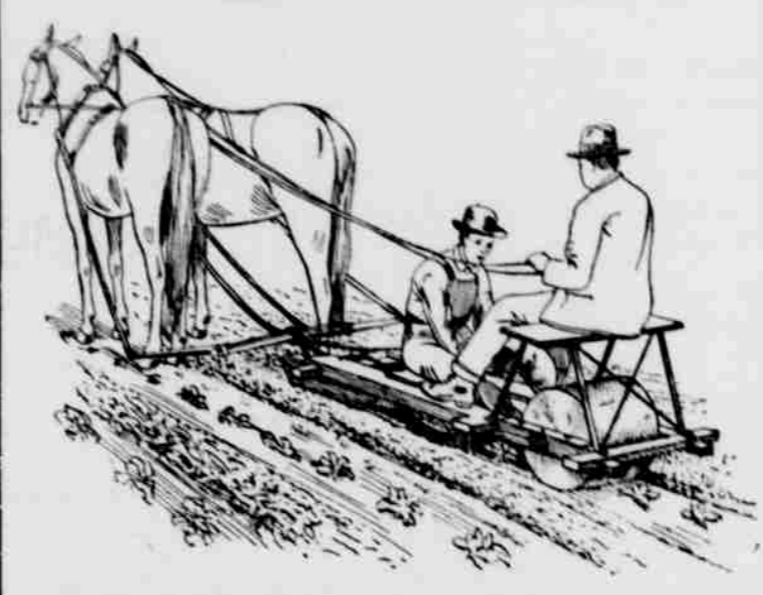

He was out yesterday and had a long consultation with his wife-slayer. It will take all of Rosclair's property to defend his case, thus killing the forlorn hope that Rosclair might consider his neck of less importance than aid to his small children in the East.

The hay crop is light. T. H. Tongue made a business trip to The Dalles, the fore part of the week.

Mr. and Mrs. W. N. Barrett pleasantly entertained the M. E. church choir, Tuesday night. About fifteen persons were present, and an enjoyable time was experienced. Light refreshments were served, and music and a guessing contest were features of the entertainment.

Mayor Lane, of Portland, has vetoed the ordinance giving the United Railways a one-year extension of time to build its line to the Calvary Cemetery and Hillsboro. His reason is that the action by which time was extended, is illegal.

Jas Higginbottom, of Vernonia, was in this city yesterday. He says the new railroad will come within about 15 miles of Vernonia by the wagon road. He reports the valley as being in a prosperous condition.

The Oregon Electric will stop its west bound cars at the cemetery Monday morning, account of the Monday Day services, as follows: 8:05 and 10 o'clock cars, leaving Hillsboro; return cars, reaching Hillsboro at 8:55 and 11:10; stop at cemetery to allow Hillsboro people to face back to the city. A five-cent fare has been granted, so this will enable people visiting the cemetery to ride both ways if they desire.

W. A. Lynn, aged about 18 years, and one of the best known and most highly esteemed young men north of Glencoe, is worried over a case of mistaken identity. It appears that a young fellow named away with a Portland girl and married over in Washington. The bride was but 15 years of age, and the irate mother sent an officer after them. The Business College gave it out that the groom was the Glencoe boy, much to his discomfort. The Glencoe W. A. Lynn was in company with his mother, Mrs. J. A. Lynn, at the Hillsboro Sanitarium, while the bridegroom Lynn was making his wedding trip.

BOARD LETS CONTRACTS

At a session of the county board held here last Saturday, bids were opened for quarrying and crushing rock at Cedar Mill, and for hauling and crushing rock at Thatcher. The successful bidders were as follows: For quarrying and crushing rock at Cedar Mill, J. B. Hainline, Portland, whose bid was \$1.15 per cubic yard. This contract will call for an expenditure of about \$2400, and 1500 cubic yards of rock will be quarried and crushed ready for the roads.

At Thatcher, John Berger had the lowest bid, and was awarded the contract. Berger's bid was \$1.00 per cubic yard, and the hauling was at a figure far below other bids, the farmers of the Thatcher section having raised a subscription of \$200 to apply on the work of hauling the rock after it had been crushed.

The work at Cedar Mill will begin just as soon as the county board can buy a new rock crusher. The county now has one crusher, and will buy another one next Friday, in Portland. It is estimated the new crusher will cost in the neighborhood of \$1700.

Work will begin on the Thatcher contract, when similar work is finished at Gaston, where one of the county crushers is now at work. An old rock crusher was recently sold to the Scholle road district.
