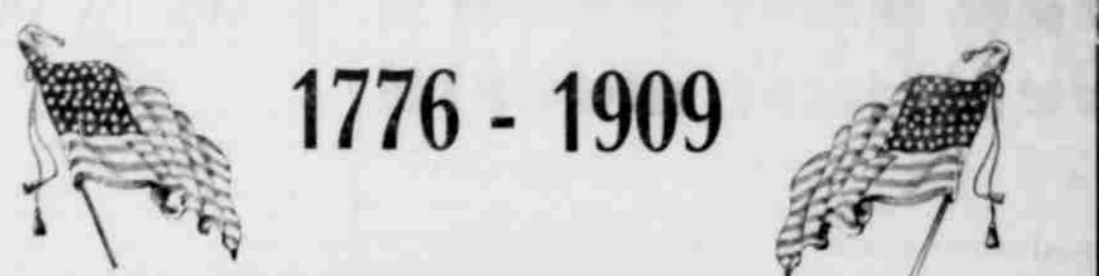

The telegraph wire for the P. R. & N. is now finished clear to the front, and it will be used as a private line in telephoning on the Pacific States system. As soon as the road gets well into the mountains, and material and other trains are running, telegraph instruments will be installed.
