TEN TONS OF VETCH YIELD TO THE ACRE

Oak Cove Farm, North Plains Will Have 3 Crops

HOW IT PAYS TO IRRIGATE LAND

Just What is Wanted for the Dairy Industry

Attorney Geo. R. Bagley says that he expects to cut three crops of vetch this year on the Oak Cove Farm, North Plains, a large part of which is under irrigation.

The first crop of vetch was cut a fortnight ago, and water was immediately turned on. He expects to again cut a crop on or about Aug. 10, and he will again irrigate and cut another crop from the 1st to the 10th of October.

Basing his expectations on his knowledge of conditions and yield under irrigation systems, Mr. Bagley expects the three harvests to give him ten tons of vetch, cured, to the acre. This is going some, and is a hint to dairymen as to results of summer irrigation.

Mr. Bagley commenced his irrigation plant two years ago, and the increase of yield has already paid the expense of installing the plant.
