County Board Denies Gales Creek Applications

COUNTY SELLS OLD ROCK CRUSHER

County Board Passes on Much Business at Rec at Term

The county board met last week and transacted the business accumulated during the month of June. The liquor petitions for saloons in Gales Creek precinct met with hard sledding. One was killed by a remonstrance and the other was withdrawn at the last minute, as it, too, was overwhelmed with a remonstrance.

The county clerk was directed to make a bill of sale to Road District No. 8, Scholls-Kinton section, for the old rock crusher sold by the county to the district, for the sum of \$700.

Road petition Henry Hendrickson et al. approved by district attorney and the following were appointed as viewers to meet and view on July 22: Joseph Connell and Wm. Babelder and county surveyor.

Bond C. B. Buchanan & Co., in the sum of \$5,000, for warehouse, was approved, and license was issued.

Mrs. Fridtag, of near Blooming, was allowed a monthly relief support of \$4.00.

J. W. Shute granted permission to build fence along Road A98, near Shute schoolhouse.

Road Supervisor Borwick, north of Reedville, ordered to open O'Meara road, established some months ago.

N. G. Davis withdrew resignation as justice of the peace for East Cedar precinct; matter in statu quo.

Recorder Willis Ireland reports June fees at \$498.35 and Clerk Bailey reports fees of county clerk's office for same month at \$588.75.

Beaverton-Willsburg R. R. granted permission to build line across the various county roads. This is the S. P. line running from Beaverton to the Willamette River, steel on which is now being laid.

Samuel Stowell was appointed road supervisor for Road District No. 21, Buxton precinct, vice G. W. Hines, resigned.
