## TOWN SURVEY IS NOW COMPLETED

City Expends Three Hundred Dollars for Lines

THREE DRAINS AWAY FROM TOWN

Advises Igainst Septic Tank System Until Investigated

The city council met last night and took up the report of Civil Engineer Thos. S. Wilkes, who has nade a survey of the city for drainage and levels. The report is voluminous, and was accompanied by blue prints with all the elevation. showing Thorne's Addition as the highest point in the limits. Mr. Wilkes adviced against building he septic tank system until a bacteriologist, who knows his business, has been consulted, as he says that apon study he finds the percentage of pure water coming from a tank has been greatly overestimated in nearly all cases.
