PROCLAMATION Whereas, on the 10th day of June, 1909, Ordinance No. 299 of the City of Hillsboro, Washington County, Oregon, was passed, filed and approved for the proposed amendment of sub-division 64 of section 5 of the Act incorporating the City of Hillsboro, Washington County, Oregon, filed in the office of the Secretary of State, February 2, 1893, as amended by an Act approved February 6, 1896, and as further amended by an Act approved February 5, 1899, and as further amended by an Act filed in the office of the Secretary of State on January 27, 1905, and as further amended by initiative petition December 3, 1906, and ordering a special election and fixing the date thereof, and

Whereas said proposed amendment authorizes the city council to give notice of proposed sidewalk or street improvements by publication or posting, and

Whereas a special election was ordered by said ordinance to be held on Monday, the 16th day of August, 1909, and

Whereas said proposed amendment was in due form as required by Ordinance No. 297 of the City of Hillsboro, Oregon, and was duly submitted to a vote of the legal voters of Hillsboro, Oregon, at the special election held in said City on August 16, 1909, and the said vote having been officially canvassed and certified and it appearing that said proposed amendment received 65 affirmative votes and 5 negative votes and the total number of votes cast at said election was 79.

Now Therefore, I, J. W. Connell, as Mayor of the City of Hillsboro, Oregon, in obedience to and by virtue of the power and authority vested in me by the ordinances of said city, do hereby make and issue this proclamation to the people of the city of Hillsboro, Oregon, and do hereby announce and declare that said charter amendment received an affirmative majority of all effective votes cast at said election and that said amendment shall take effect and be in full force next from and after the 27th day of August, 1909.
