The president will also find time to address a monster crowd in the Natural Amphitheatre, mush down the Pay Streak, attend an elaborate luncheon, visit the United States government buildings and the Igorrote village.

CONDENSER CLOSES AT HILLSBORO PLANT

Will not Open for Thirty Days-Possibly not Then

WILL OVERBAUL PLANT AND RETAIR

Understood That There Must be More Patronage

Manager Paterson closed down the Hillsboro Condensed Milk Plant Monday morning, throwing out of employment a large number of people. The plant will not be in operation for the next thirty days or such a matter, and, it is understood, will not reopen unless there is a larger patronage upon the part of dairymen and farmers,

As the matter now stands it is alleged by those who appear to know-although Mr. Paterson was non commital on the subject-that the intake of milk is not sufficient to operate the plant on a basis of profit, and the company takes this time to put in extensive repaire, and will open again only when the milk supply is greater than it has been the past few months.

A large part of the shortage of the milk supply is due to the fact that there is a big war on unsanitary milk in Multnemsh county, and many of the dairies on the Cotumbia River bave been declared unsanitary. The Portland cream users have been scouring Washington County for cream and many dairymen have left the condenser for one cause or another, and allege that the Portland prices give them a better profit for their

If this section ships exclusively to Portland and there shou'd be a drop in prices there is no question but what many will return to shipping to the lo-cal plant. On the other hand if the price holds up, owing to the war on the tuberculous cows of Multnomah shipment to Portland will continue. As the matter now stands it will doubtless mean no condenser in this city. But, if the Port-land buyers begin to think they have a cinch, and shortweight their trade, or drop the price, or do not deal fairly, something will be doing.


