Will get Rock Next Year From Oregon Iron & Steel

COUNTY GETS A GENEROUS DEAL

Southern Pacific Will Haul 25 Miles at 25 Cents per Ton

The County Court is in session for the November term this week, and will get through today or tomorrow. The board has made arrangements to have the county rock crusher located on the Oregon Iron & Steel Co.'s property on the Baxton & Hillsburg branch of the Southern Pacific, and the Iron company will give all the rock wanted from a charge. This will save moving the crusher here and there, and the Southern Pacific Company has agreed to haul the crushed product 25 miles at a price not to exceed 25 cents per ton. The court figure, with no moving, and the cheap rate that rock can be laid down in Hillsboro practically as cheap as though a crusher and quarry were located here. The work will begin in the Spring and road districts wanting special rates in order to get rock should get busy. The County Judge has written all supervisors asking for suggestions on making better winter roads. He has advised them to keep their ditches open, and permits that the split-log drag, when used, has accomplished wonderful results. In some districts he states the farmers are forming log clubs, and will drag once a week, and the supervisors are requested to furnish the drags. If these are used, the ridges close to edge of the ditches are kept down, giving better drainage, he expects better road results. He also asks the supervisors to ascertain what the requirement is in regard to special levies for rock work.
