

BIGGEST SHOOT FOR MANY YEARS

Over 100 Turkeys Shot for Last Sunday

HERBERT MILLER LANDS PRIZE

About Two Hundred Meet at Oak Park at Shootfest

Nearly two hundred were in attendance at the turkey shoot and rifle at Oak Park, a mile west of town, on the Oregon Electric, last Sunday, and the throng remained throughout the day, although in the afternoon it was very stormy.

The cash prizes of \$7.50, paid for the best score out of fifty shots at bluebirds, was won by Herbert Miller, with the Nelson Hardware Company, and Wm. Nelson, who put up the cash, begins to think that there are some good shots in this section. The scores on competition were:

Herbert Miller, 38 out of 48. Nick Williams, 37 out of 48. Oscar Hundley, 37 out of 48. Harvey Bachelor, 32 out of 48. Ed Harvey Bachelor shot 8 times more, and won every shot, he would have won the prize.

OREN RANSOM MEACHAM

Missoula, Montana, Nov. 23—(Special) Extra train No. 22, west-bound on the Ceur d'Alene branch of the Northern Pacific ran into a slide near Iron Mountain, at 5 o'clock this morning while going at a speed of 35 miles an hour, the engine turning completely over.

Engineer Oren Ransom Meacham, of Washington County, Oregon, being so badly injured that he died within an hour after the accident. The engine fell 30 feet over an embankment into the river.

Oren Ransom Meacham was born above Mountsindale, on the old Meacham homestead, August 12, 1879. Years ago he entered railway employ on the Northern Pacific, as fireman, and in 1907 was given his engine, with a run out of Missoula, Montana. He was a member of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen, Locomotive Engineers, and the Elks. He married in Everett, Wash., and the wife and one child, a son, born in June, 1908, survive him.
