WOOD ALCOHOL

'Bacons, Ore., Nov. 26.—Dear Mr. Argus: We are having trouble of our own back here in the mountains, over the chemical properties of wood alcohol. Please tell us what it is made from and oblige, yours resp. C. T. D."

First, wood is reduced to charcoal in a closed retort, and a liquid is the distillation. This distillate is a strong acid solution. After standing a time this solution separates into two bodies—a heavy, tarry layer on top, and a watery layer underneath, one per cent of which is alcohol. This watery layer is then neutralized with quicklime and redistilled, and the result is a crude methyl alcohol, which is subjected to a saturation of fused calcium chloride, and the result is a crystallized compound. These crystals are separated, dissolved in water, again distilled, and the product rectified over lime, and then you have wood alcohol as used for heating and mechanical purposes. Almost every wood yields the distillate, but oak and maple, birch, etc., have a larger per cent than the purely resinous woods. This alcohol is very poisonous, and is rarely used in medicine except in extreme cases of dysentery and occasionally in tuberculous cases. Many people have bought wood alcohol and reduced it for use as a beverage, and when so used it not infrequently produces fees for the coroner.
