FOR RURAL ROUTES

The Fourth Ass'tant P. M. General sends Postmaster Cornelius the following order effecting the rural routes:—In view of the extent to which the pr. use of placing loose coins in boxes by rural patrons has grown, and the delay in the delivery and collection of mail and the hardship imposed on rural carriers incident thereto, you are informed that, commencing February 15, proxim., rural letter carriers will not be required to collect loose coins from rural mail boxes.

Carriers should enclose coins in an envelope, wrap them securely in a piece of paper, or deposit them in a coin holding receptacle so they can be easily and quickly taken from boxes, and carriers will be required to lift such coins, and the same accompanied by mail for dispatch, attach the requisite stamps.

An Indian party was given by the Sophomores to the Junior and Freshman classes of the Hillsboro High School on Saturday evening, Jan. 29, at the K. O. K. A. gymnasium. The gymnasium was decorated with young fir trees, and the walls were hung with Indian blankets and ornaments. In one corner stood a wigwam, and near it was a campfire, over which a kettle was hanging. Several appropriate games were played during the evening. In one, a bow, made of willow, and tied with the High School colors—Vale blue and white—was given to each person, together with a bundle of ten arrows. If any one said "Yes" or "No" he had to give an arrow to the one whom he spoke. Miss Vesta McFee won the prize, as she had the greatest number of arrows. Then the guests were sent to hunt with their bows and arrows for animals hidden about the room. Prof. Barnes won the prize, a tiny birch-bark canoe. Refreshments, consisting of hominy, brown bread, and dried beef sandwiches, pop-corn and puffed rice brittle, were served by the Misses Faye Sigler, Bessie Simon, Rheta Wilkes and Gladys Lynton, who were dressed as Indian maidens. Punch was served at the wigwam by an Indian maid, Miss Alma Rice. The evening was closed by the singing of the High School song, and an Indian dance given by the five girls in costume. The success of the party was due largely to the ready assistance and energy of Miss Smith, one of the High School teachers.
