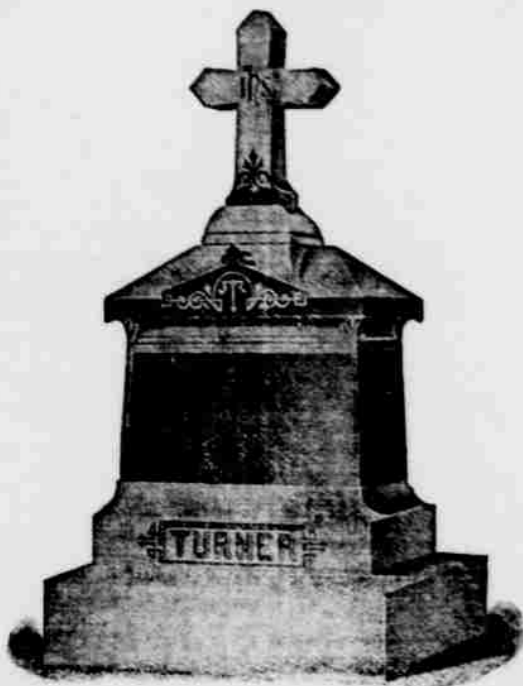

The comet A-1910 was viewed for the first time here, by many, Friday evening. Schulmerich and Trullinger, also talk of putting in a neat looking cement watering trough to displace the old one, which has answered the purpose for a number of years. Let the good work go on.

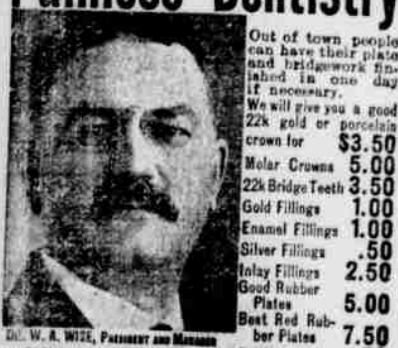
