

### UNITED MAKES NEW SURVEY

#### Crew Now Running Line of Glencoe to Banks

Way Change the Entire Route

An engineer's corps is surveying for the United, and running a line north of Glencoe, heading for the Banks or Cedar Canyon direction, and many now think that the line is to be steam equipped, and that the company is heading for Tillamook, via the Cedar Canyon route, possibly, and that the Forest Grove and Hillsboro lines only are to be electrified.

### AGED GROVE MAN SAW HALLEY COMET

#### James Luck, Soon Ninety-five Years, Remembers it

WAS THEN TWENTY YEARS OLD

Father-in-law of John E. Bailey, of Forest Grove

Dr. Linklater, in talking with his aged patients, has been looking for some one who remembers Halley's comet, and his search has been rewarded in the person of Jas. Luck, who will be 95 years of age March 9. Mr. Luck is the father-in-law of J. E. Bailey, the well known merchant of Forest Grove. He tells the Doctor that he well remembers seeing the famous comet, in 1835, and that as he recalls it, the tail looked to be several feet in length. He says that he has seen brighter comets since. Mr. Luck carries his age splendidly and retains his faculties as well as the average man of forty or fifty.

Dr. Linklater, after giving the comet much study, is of the opinion that Halley was the famous sky visitor hanging over Jerusalem at the time the city's splendor was destroyed by the Romans. The visitor is mentioned by Josephus, the Roman Jewish historian.
