A Japanese Spy

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During the wars in Japan between the adherents of the mikado and the shogun the mikado's troops were besieging a fortress which both sides wanted. But there is one matter of importance concerning it that is pertinent to this story. The mikado's army was very small, and a force of the shoguns was coming up to the relief of the besieged. This force was expected within a week. The success of the mikado depended upon how long his enemy's supplies would hold out. If there were enough for but a few days the besiegers might remain and reap the benefit of their labors. There came a noble to the mikado and said to him: "O mighty emperor, it is on account of your majesty's virtue that I feel an impulse spring up within me. My ancestors are looking down upon me and smile pleasantly upon me as I yield to the inspiration. I will disguise myself and obtain admittance to the fortress. There I will observe for how many days your enemies are supplied, and I will return and advise you of the fact."
