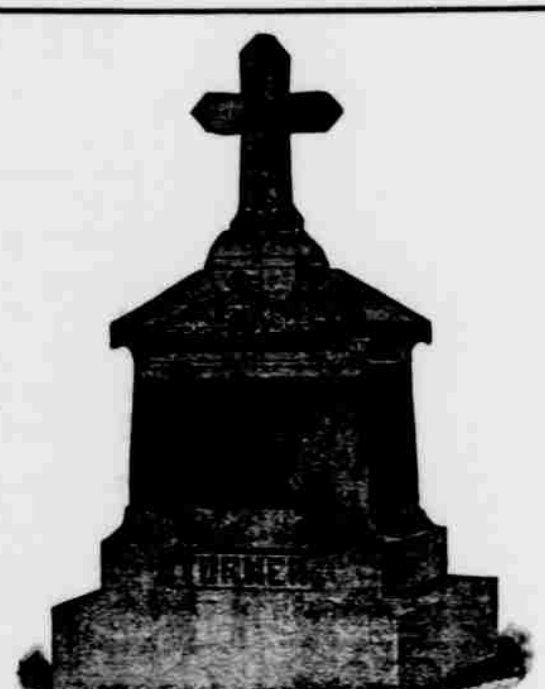
NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS
