A large crowd attended the band concert given by the Hillsboro Reed & Cornet Band at the Crescent Theatre, Monday evening—and the result was a revelation to music lovers. The band is a credit to the city and to the musical organizations of the state, and Hillsboro should be and is extremely proud of their prowess.

The band boys clearly proved their ability along concert lines, and the band of a few months ago is not the band of today. Chas. S. MONDAY THE BANNER COLLECTION

Total Tax Collection Will go to the \$180,000 Mark

When all is computed, it is estimated that up to last night the total collection of the 1910 tax at the sheriff's office will run into the grand total of \$180,000. Monday was the banner day for collections, the taxpayers passing over the counter the magnificent sum of \$20,227.05. The total daily collections to date follow:
