

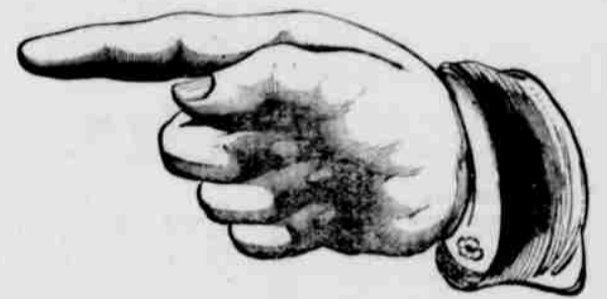

FORMER HILLSBORO WOMAN LOSES CHILD

Little Girl, Two Years old, Falls Into Boiling Lard

DIED FROM SCALDS IN TWO HOURS

Mother of Babe was Formerly Miss Martha Wagner

Verna, the little two year old daughter of Alfred Brugger and wife, of 108 Nelson Street, Portland, fell into a cauldron of boiling lard, in which her father was cooking doughnuts, and died from the scalds within two hours. The father had just taken the boiler of hot grease from the stove and placed it in the center of the room. The little one fell into the receptacle, receiving the fatal burning. The father badly scalded his hands and arms in extracting the child, and the mother also received some severe burns.

The mother was formerly Miss Martha Wagner, of Hillsboro, and she is the daughter of Wm. Wagner, the shoemaker who was well known to many of the Germans and Swiss of Washington County, and who for many years had a shoemaker shop in this city, in the Chenette Row, on Main Street. The babe was two years old the day of the fatality.
