COUNTY MAY BUILD STEEL SPAN BRIDGE

County Court Asks for Bids on Structure Across Tualatin

ONE MILE SOUTH OF CORNELIUS
Six Hundred Feet of Fill Leads to Approach of Span

The county court this week is advertising for the construction of a bridge across the Tualatin River, one mile south of Cornelius. The call asks for an estimate both on wood span and steel span, and if the difference on cost is not too much the steel structure will be preferred. In the long run, steel spans are the thing for they do not have to be renewed like the wooden structures.

There will be a 600 foot fill leading to the span, on the south side of the river. Contractors must put up a certified check for 5 per cent of the amounts of their bids.

Separate bids will be considered for the span and earthwork.
