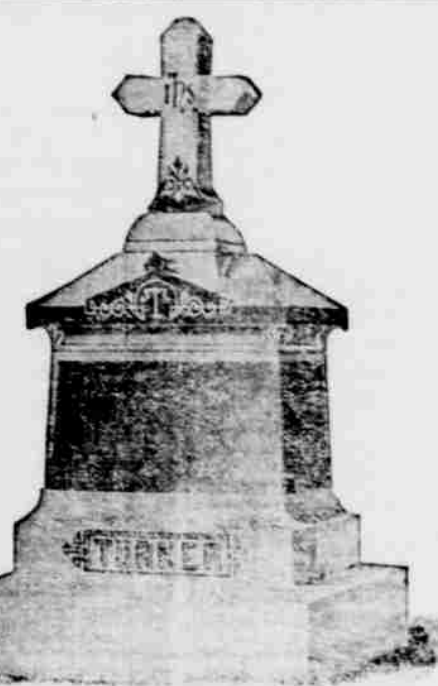

SUMMONS

In the name of the state of Oregon:—You are hereby required to appear in the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for the County of Washington, on or before the 12th day of May, 1910, then and there to make answer to the complaint of plaintiff, and if you fail so to appear and make answer, plaintiff will apply to the court for the relief prayed for in its complaint, to-wit, for a judgment appropriating to plaintiff's use the following described real property situate in the County of Washington and State of Oregon, to-wit:
