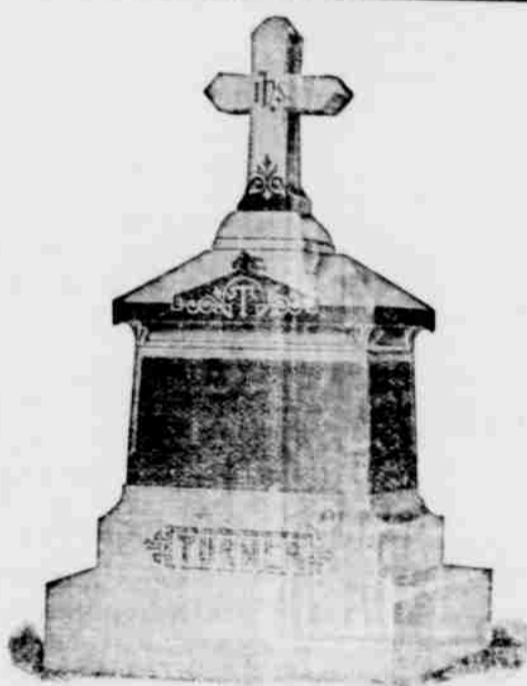

SICK WOMAN TRIES TO END HER LIFE

Mrs. Ernest W. Foord Swallows Carbolic Acid, Friday

RAW ALCOHOL SAVES HER LIFE

Dr. F. A. Bailey Arrives in Time to Administer Antidote

Mrs. Ernest W. Foord, formerly Miss Dora Smith, attempted suicide, last Friday afternoon, by taking a portion of the contents of an ounce and half bottle of carbolic acid. Mrs. Foord has been ill for some time, and in despondent moods had threatened to end her life. Her declarations, however, were not taken seriously, and, when she attempted the suicide it came as a surprise. Immediately after she had taken the deadly poison, Dr. F. A. Bailey was summoned. He at once administered raw alcohol, one of the best antidotes for the poison, and this saved her life, although her condition was critical.

The Foords were married August 19, 1908, and have lived in East Hillsboro since their union.
