JOHN SIEMER AGAIN IN TOILS OF THE LAW

Former Washington County Convict Again Forges a Note

WAS GIVEN TEN YEARS BY M'BRIDE

Siemer now in Trouble Back at Meppen, Illinois, and Under Arrest

John Siemer, who came here from Illinois several years ago and had a meteoric career in the criminal annals of the county, was a few days ago arrested at Meppen, Illinois, on the charge of forgery.

The Calhoun Herald, of Hardin, Ill., in a recent issue, says:

John Siemer, of Meppen, forged the names of John Droege, Barney Droege, Anton Westerman and Herman Kronable to a note for \$2000 and cashed the same at the Bank of Brussels last Thursday receiving therefor a draft from the cashier, Paul Zigrang. Soon after the transaction Mr. Zigrang telephoned to some of the sureties on the note and was told that if their names were on the note it was a forgery as they had signed no note. Siemer had represented himself to be Nicholas Siemer, a prosperous farmer of North Calhoun, who formerly lived at Meppen and Brussels and his name with the others was on the note. As soon as Mr. Zigrang discovered he was holding a forged and worthless note he at once got busy and put the local constable on the forger's trail and he was soon arrested and the draft recovered. In bringing in his man the constable did not expect any difficulty and let him get away and he was not rearrested until Tuesday. Sheriff Faulkerson went to Alton Monday night and arrested him, arriving in Hardin Tuesday evening with his prisoner. He waived examination at the preliminary before Esq. Cooke and was placed under a \$1000 bond which he has so far failed to give and is in jail where he will probably remain until the October term of circuit court. Siemer comes from a good family. His father is an honest, upright, industrious farmer, who is respected by all who know him and the action of this young man is much to be regretted for the sorrow it brings to his aged father.

It will be remembered that Siemer first came here and negotiated for the Jack Roy farm, near Roy. He gained possession of the place, and had a chance to make good. He finally forged the name of Jacob Mauss, his father-in-law, and the name of Bernard Ostermann, of Verboort, to a note, and cashed it at the Shute Bank. It was soon discovered that the note was a forgery. The bank took up the mortgage on the farm, and afterward received enough from its sale and sale of personal property, to recoup its loss. Siemer was arrested and given ten years by Judge McBride. He was a model prisoner and was given a parole later on.

Game Warden Robt. Stevenson, of Forest Grove, was down to the city, Tuesday. He says that the law prohibiting the killing of does was one of the best measures ever enacted, and that it has been a life saver. Before that law went into effect, there were eleven men killed annually, and last season, but one man was killed by accident. The surety in the present law is that a man will not be moved to shoot unless he sees a pair of prongs. The law, as to the open season, has been changed and the killing season for bucks is now August 1. Hunters—and Hillsboro and Forest Grove always has a lot of them, not to exclude our old friend Geo. Armentrout—should bear this change of date in mind.

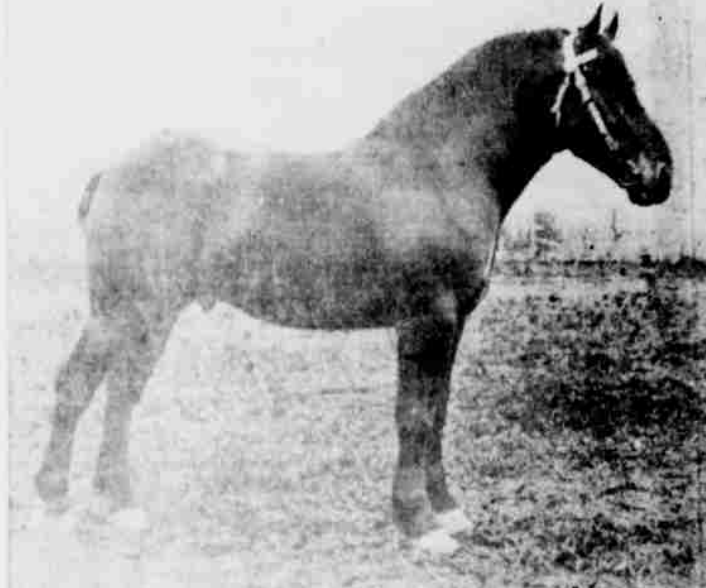
