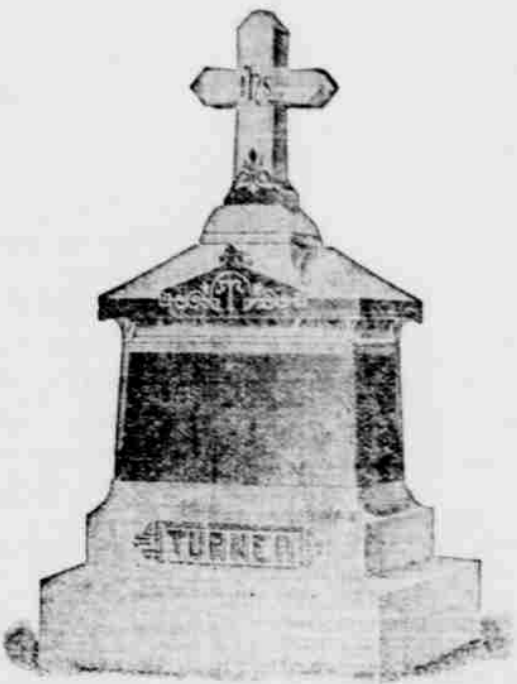

Edward D. Baker, aged 48 years, and a native of Beaverdam, Wis., died at the Salem State Hospital, May 27, 1910. Baker lived at Crawford, where he had 40 acres of land. He leaves a wife and four small children. The land has a \$300 mortgage on it, but Baker leaves \$2,000 in the Modern Woodmen, which will go to his wife and family, and this will leave them in fair circumstances. About a year ago, Baker was taken ill, and he went to Portland on a visit with a relative. While there he accidentally shot himself with a revolver, the bullet entering his mind, as he was of an intensely nervous temperament. He was sent to the asylum, but became gradually worse. For the past several weeks it was necessary to strap him to his couch. The body was taken to Crawford, on the P. R. & N., Monday, by C. L. Brown, a neighbor, who went to Salem to take charge of the remains.
