## WANT A NEW ROAD OVER TO TILLAMOOK

Tillamook County Court Asked to Expend \$15,000 for Change

WICKERSHAM WANTS AUTO PATH Dispatch Says Washington County Will Also be Approached

L. B. Wickersham, vice president of the United Railways, is an enthusiast for a new road between Washington and Tillamook counties, and a dispatch from the coast city states that he asked the county board over there to expend \$15,000 for the avowed change. He wants the Tillamook people to follow the Wilson river instead of turning off at the South fork, and he says that by heading toward Glenwood 700 feet of elevation would be eliminated.

Then, contends Mr. Wickersham, if Washington County would spend a like amount from Glenwood on to the county line there would be a fine thoroughfare the year around—and one superb for autos. As there are two railway lines headed for Tillamook, both of which are expected to be over there in a few months, or by next year some time, just why either county should spend a bunch of money to open a new wagon road is not made very evident to the average taxpayer.
