CHOIR OF ONE HUNDRED VOICES

Rev. Herbert C. Hart and Prof. Arthur Magann Arrive Tomorrow

All the plans for the great union meetings of the churches of Hillsboro, Oregon and Cornelius, assisted by Forest Grove, in the big tent on the court house grounds are complete. Rev. Herbert C. Hart and Prof. Arthur Magann will arrive in Hillsboro tomorrow, and will be the guests of County Assessor Max Crandall during their stay. Friday night at 8 o'clock, Prof. Magann will commence rehearsing the large choir of a hundred voices.

The churches will hold Sunday School as usual next Sunday morning, but at eleven a. m., the Baptist, Congregational, Free Methodist, Christian, Methodist, Evangelical and the Christian Adventist churches will unite in the great opening service in the tent. All citizens, regardless of party or creed, are urged by the ministry to make a great effort to be present and extend a welcome worthy of Hillsboro to these famous Evangelists. Mr. Hart will also speak at 3 p. m. and 7 p. m., on Sunday and each day next week.

College and School.

Professor Louis T. Moore, brother-in-law of President Taft, has been elected dean of the College of Liberal Arts of the University of Cincinnati. Moore is professor of physics at the university.
